Main surveillance developments in weeks 32–33/2010 (09 Aug 2010 – 22 Aug 2010)

This first page contains the main developments of the last two weeks and can be printed separately or together with the more detailed information following.

- Epidemiological indicators show no influenza activity in the 17 reporting EU countries
- A few Influenza A and B viruses were sporadically detected in non-sentinel specimens during weeks 32–33/2010

Sentinel surveillance of influenza-like illness (ILI)/acute respiratory infection (ARI): All 17 reporting countries experienced low influenza activity and no or sporadic geographic activity and stable trends. For more information, [click here](#).

Virological surveillance: Sentinel physicians collected 28 respiratory specimens, of which none were positive for influenza virus. Influenza A and B viruses were sporadically detected in non-sentinel specimens. For more information, [click here](#).


Sentinel surveillance (ILI/ARI)

Weekly analysis – epidemiology

During weeks 32–33/2010, 16 of 29 (55%) countries reported the intensity indicator. For the 24th consecutive week, all reporting countries experienced low intensity (Map 1, Table1).

The geographic spread indicator was reported by 17 countries for these weeks. Cyprus and UK (England and Wales) reported sporadic ILI/ARI activity. The other 15 countries reported no activity (Map 2, Table 1). For the trend indicator, all countries reported a stable trend (Table 1).

Map 1: Intensity for weeks 32–33/2010





Description of the system

This surveillance is based on nationally organized sentinel networks of physicians, mostly general practitioners (GPs), covering at least 1–5% of the population in their countries. All EU/EEA Member States (except Liechtenstein) are participating. Depending on their country's choice, each sentinel physician reports the weekly number of patients seen with influenza-like illness (ILI), acute respiratory infection (ARI) or both to a national focal point. From the national level, both numerator and denominator data are then reported to the European Surveillance System (TESSy) database. Additional semi-quantitative indicators of intensity, geographic spread and trend of influenza activity at the national level are also reported.

Virological surveillance

Weekly analysis – virology

During weeks 32 and 33/2010, 17 countries and the UK (England, Northern Ireland and Scotland) reported virological data. Table 2 shows the distribution of both sentinel and non-sentinel specimens by type and subtype. Sentinel physicians collected 28 specimens, none of which were positive for influenza virus. Four non-sentinel source specimens (e.g., specimens collected for diagnostic purposes in hospital settings) tested positive for influenza B, one for influenza A(H3) and one for the 2009 pandemic A(H1N1) virus. Another seven non-sentinel samples tested positive for influenza A virus, however, these viruses were not subtyped (Table 2).

Cumulative data since week 40/2009 show that subtyping was performed on 16 199 type A influenza viruses detected in samples from sentinel practices. Of these, 99.6% (16 141) were identified as the 2009 pandemic A(H1N1) virus (Table 2). The proportion of positive sentinel samples has remained at low levels in Europe since week 07/2010.

In summary, all 2009 pandemic A(H1N1) viruses received from EU countries have been antigenically similar and genetically closely related to the vaccine virus A/California/7/2009. In addition, most of the circulating influenza B viruses have been closely related to the current vaccine strain B/Brisbane/60/2008 (Victoria lineage; Table 3).

Country comments

Norway, week 33: One influenza A(H3) virus was detected in Norway in week 33, in a child for whom we have no information regarding travel abroad.

Description of the system

According to the nationally defined sampling strategy, sentinel physicians take nasal or pharyngeal swabs from patients with influenza-like illness (ILI), acute respiratory infection (ARI) or both and send the specimens to influenza-specific reference laboratories for virus detection, (sub-)typing, antigenic or genetic characterisation and antiviral susceptibility testing.

Hospital surveillance – severe acute respiratory infection (SARI)

Weekly analysis – SARI

During weeks 32 and 33/2010, only one SARI case was reported to TESSy. However, the causative agent of this SARI case is currently unknown.

Since the beginning of SARI surveillance, 11 countries reported 11 461 cases and 576 related fatalities (Table 4). In cases where influenza virus was detected, 99.7% were 2009 pandemic A(H1N1) viruses (Table 5).
