## Weekly influenza surveillance overview

7 December 2012

# Main surveillance developments in week 48/2012 (26 Nov-2 Dec 2012)

This first page contains the main developments for this week and can be printed separately or together with the more detailed information that follows.

Weekly reporting on influenza surveillance in Europe for the 2012-13 season started in week 40/2012.

- In week 48/2012, all 28 countries reporting experienced low-intensity activity of influenza-like illness or acute respiratory infection.
- Of 520 sentinel specimens tested across 21 countries, 46 (8.8%) were positive for influenza virus. This is an increase compared with week 47/2012 when 3.1% of specimens were positive.
- Of the influenza virus detections in sentinel specimens since week 40/2012, 46% were type A and 54% were type B viruses. Of the A viruses subtyped, two thirds were A(H3) and one third were A(H1).
- The number of RSV detections continued to increase in week 48.
- No hospitalised laboratory-confirmed influenza cases were reported in week 48.

The proportion of sentinel specimens positive for influenza virus has increased since the early weeks of the season, but there is still little epidemiological evidence of sustained influenza virus transmission in EU/EEA countries.

**Sentinel surveillance of influenza-like illness (ILI)/ acute respiratory infection (ARI):** Clinical influenza activity of low intensity was notified by all 28 countries reporting, with 14 of them indicating sporadic, one local, and 13 no geographic spread. **Virological surveillance:** Twenty-four countries reported virological data. Sentinel physicians collected 520 specimens, of which 46 (8.8%) tested positive for influenza virus. For more information, <u>click here</u>.

## Sentinel surveillance (ILI/ARI)

### Weekly analysis - epidemiology


During week 48/2012, all 28 countries reporting clinical data experienced low-intensity influenza activity (Table 1, Map 1).

Geographic spread was reported as local by Malta and sporadic by 14 countries. The remaining 13 countries reported no activity (Table 1, Map 2).

Stable trends in clinical activity were reported by 23 countries, while an increasing trend was reported by France. Decreasing trends were reported by Bulgaria, Poland, Romania and Slovakia (Table 1, Map 2).

There is still little epidemiological evidence of sustained influenza virus transmission in EU/EEA countries.

Map 1. Intensity for week 48/2012





#### **Description of the system**

Surveillance is based on nationally organised sentinel networks of physicians, mostly general practitioners (GPs), covering at least 1 to 5% of the population in their countries. All EU/EEA Member States (except Liechtenstein) participate. Depending on their country's choice, each sentinel physician reports the weekly number of patients seen with ILI, ARI, or both to a national focal point. From the national level, both numerator and denominator data are then reported to the European Surveillance System (TESSy) database. Additional semi-quantitative indicators of intensity, geographic spread, and trend of influenza activity at the national level are also reported.

## Virological surveillance

#### Weekly analysis - virology




Figure 2. Number of sentinel specimens positive for influenza virus, by type, subtype and by week of report, weeks 40–48/2012




Figure 3. Number of non-sentinel specimens positive for influenza virus by type, subtype and week of report, weeks 40–48/2012

In week 48/2012, 24 countries reported virological data. Of 520 sentinel specimens tested, 46 (8.8%) were positive for influenza virus (Tables 1–2, Figure 1). This is an increase compared with week 47/2012 when 3.1% of specimens were positive for influenza virus. In addition, 127 non-sentinel source specimens (e.g. specimens collected for diagnostic purposes in hospitals) were found to be positive for influenza virus (Table 2). Of the 173 influenza viruses detected from sentinel and non-sentinel sources during week 48/2012, 82 (47.4%) were type A and 91 (52.6%) were type B. Of the 34 influenza A viruses subtyped, 21 (61.8%) were A(H1)pdm09 and 13 (38.2%) were A(H3). Thirteen B viruses were characterised further: nine (69.2%) were of B-Yamagata lineage and four (30.8%) of B-Victoria lineage (Table 2, Figures 2 and 3).

Of the 132 influenza virus detections in sentinel specimens since week 40/2012, 61 (46.2%) were type A, and 71 (53.8%) were type B viruses. Of 51 influenza A viruses subtyped, 34 (66.7%) were A(H3) and 17 (33.3%) were A(H1)pdm09. Eight B viruses were characterised further: sic (75.0%) were of B- Yamagata lineage and two (25.0%) were Victoria (Table 2, Figure 2).

Of the 614 influenza viruses detected from non-sentinel sources since week 40/2012, 369 (60.1%) were type A, and 245 (39.9%) were type B. Of 187 type A viruses subtyped, 97 (51.9%) were A(H1)pdm09 and 90 (48.1%) A(H3). Sixty-five B viruses were characterised further: 57 (87.7%) were of B- Yamagata lineage and eight (12.3%) were Victoria (Table 2, Figure 3).

Since week 40/2012, 33 antigenic characterisations of influenza viruses have been reported. Twenty-seven (81.8%) have been characterised as A/Victoria/361/2011 (H3N2)-like; one as A(H1)pdm09 A/California/7/2009 (H1N1)-like; two as B/Brisbane/60/2008-like (Victoria lineage); and two as B/Wisconsin/1/2010-like (Yamagata lineage). One A(H3) virus was not attributed to any category (Table 3).

Since week 40/2012, 50 genetic characterisations of influenza viruses have been reported for sentinel and non-sentinel specimens: eight A(H1) viruses belonged to two genetic groups, 19 A(H3) to three groups, four B (Victoria lineage) to one group and 19 B (Yamagata lineage) viruses to three different genetic groups. Most of the viruses fell in either the A(H3) clade representative A/Victoria/208/2009 – A/Alabama/05/2010 group 5 or in the B (Yamagata) lineage clade representative B/Estonia/55669/2011 group (Table 4).

More details on circulating viruses can be found in the <u>October report</u> prepared by the Community Network of Reference Laboratories (CNRL) coordination team. The viruses circulating this season remain well-matched with the 2012/13 seasonal vaccine viruses.

Since week 40/2012, a total of 34 viruses have been tested for antiviral drug susceptibility. None of the 21 A(H1N1)pdm09, nine A(H3N2) and four B viruses tested for neuraminidase inhibitor susceptibility showed genetic or phenotypic evidence for (highly) reduced inhibition. Two A(H1N1)pdm09 and seven A(H3N2) viruses tested for M2 blocker susceptibility carried the S31N amino acid substitution in the M2 protein associated with M2 blocker resistance.

In week 48/2012, 10 countries reported 1 444 respiratory syncytial virus detections. The number of RSV detections has continued to increase since week 40/2012, following the trend in the number of RSV detections observed during the same period last year (Figure 4).

Figure 1. Proportion of sentinel specimens positive for influenza virus, weeks 40–48/2012



#### **Country comments**

**Norway:** Moderate and increasing number of influenza virus detections. A(H1)pdm09, A(H3) and B Yamagata lineage viruses are circulating sporadically, with influenza B (Yamagata lineage) slightly more predominant than the others.

**Spain:** Since week 40/2012, 520 sentinel specimens have been tested for influenza; 15 of them were positive for influenza B virus and one for influenza C. No A viruses have been identified so far in Spain. There is a sporadic circulation of B influenza virus and seven of them have been genetically characterised as B Yamagata lineage virus (six belonged to B/Estonia/55669/2011 and one belonged to B/Wisconsin/1/2010).

### **Description of the system**

According to the nationally defined sampling strategy, sentinel physicians take nasal or pharyngeal swabs from patients with ILI, ARI or both and send the specimens to influenza-specific reference laboratories for virus detection, (sub-)typing, antigenic or genetic characterisation and antiviral susceptibility testing.

## **Hospital surveillance – severe influenza disease**

## Weekly analysis of hospitalised laboratory-confirmed influenza cases

In week 48/2012, no hospitalised laboratory-confirmed influenza cases were reported.

Since week 40/2012, seven hospitalised laboratory-confirmed influenza cases have been reported by France, Ireland, Slovakia, Spain and Sweden. One case involved an influenza B virus, and of six type A viruses detected in the other patients, two were A(H1)pdm09, two A(H3) and two not subtyped (Tables 5 and 6).
